





## Edward Street bridge \$6.5M repair OKed

City council has given the green light to a nearly \$6.5 million replacement of the Edward Street Bridge, with work expected to begin in May and last into the fall.

Councillors voted unanimously Monday to award the tender for the project to local construction company LH North Ltd., which submitted the lowest bid for the project at \$6,458,418.95.

The bid from LH North came in over \$400,000 below that of its closest competitor, with three companies submitting bids. LH North also beat the city's pre-tender estimate of \$7.1 million by well over half a million dollars.

The real cost to the city, after accounting for HST rebates, is estimated at \$6,029,907.86.

Asked by Coun. Brian Hamilton about the decision to replace the bridge, rather than repair it at a previously estimated \$2 million, director of engineering Kayla Dixon said testing had found worse-than-expected deterioration in some sections.

"We had the ability to do just a rehabilitation, but it would mean we'd be back at that bridge probably

within 10 years doing additional work," she told councillors. "When we looked at the life cycle costing, it seemed more appropriate to do a full replacement."

Replacing the bridge also created the opportunity to add the new active transportation path running underneath it on the south side, she said.

Work to rebuild the bridge, which runs across the Neebing River between Riverview Drive and Parkway Drive, is set to begin in May.

Enbridge is expected to begin moving a gas line that runs underneath the bridge on the week of May 3. Work on the project is expected to start in earnest on the week of May 17, concluding in October or November, said project engineer Mike Vogrig.

Detours will be posted, and access will be allowed along side streets close to the bridge for local traffic only.

LH North has extensive experience with both the MTO and the City completing bridge rehabilitation and reconstruction projects, a report from Vogrig noted.

Council also approved a \$237,528.26 (including HST) contract with WSP Ltd. for construction administration and inspection on the project.

The tender was awarded by a unanimous vote of council Monday.

## Variants of concern increasing

The Thunder Bay District Health Unit says they've detected 11 new COVID-19 cases tied to variants of concern.

The health unit on Monday announced 10 new cases, but confirmed the 11 variant cases, nearly doubling the number already announced in Thunder Bay.

It takes longer to confirm variants of concern, which

were later detected in previously announced cases.

Variant strains tend to spread more rapidly and often result in more serious illness.

A day later, on Tuesday, the Thunder Bay District Health Unit announced one additional case, bringing the region's total number of cases with variants of concern to 25.

Thunder Bay remains under a province-wide stay-at-home order, which Premier Doug Ford says will be in place until at least May 20.

# Hajdu gets vaccinated

## Health minister jabbed with AstraZeneca shot on Friday

Federal Minister of Health Patty Hajdu received her first dose of the AstraZeneca vaccine on Friday and she hopes Canadians will follow suit, with new modeling numbers showing if 75 per cent of the population receives that first needle, restrictions could start to ease by the summer.

The AstraZeneca vaccine was made available to Canadians over the age of 40 earlier this week. There have been concerns expressed regarding the vaccine and a very rare risk of blood clots. The first case of a blood clot associated with the vaccine in Ontario was confirmed on Friday.

Hajdu said the risk of catching COVID-19 and spreading it in the community far exceeds any associated side effects of the vaccines.

"They are all approved for use in Canada and they are safe and effective," she said. "They stop people from getting seriously ill from COVID and they help to stop the spread in communities. That is the two goals of vaccinations."

Health care professionals agree that the risk of blood clotting is very rare and Hajdu said all licenced vaccines being administered in Canada go through a rigorous assessment process.

"There's a lot of work happening in this space obviously because vaccination is such an important tool and we want to make sure they are safe and they are effective," she said. "We are a gold standard regulator, which means other

countries look to our approvals of evidence of safety."

Hajdu added it is normal to have questions regarding vaccinations and she encourages anyone who is uncertain about any potential side effects to contact their health care provider or pharmacist.

There have been more than 11.4 million vaccine doses administered in Canada as of Friday. Chief public health officer, Dr. Theresa Tam, said new modelling suggests that if 75 per cent of Canadians receive the first dose of a COVID-19 vaccine by the end of June public health restrictions could start to ease this summer.

According to Hajdu, COVID-19 vaccine supply in Canada is capable of meeting that target and the federal government is looking at accelerating supply to get people fully vaccinated.

"Our projection is we are going to get 48 million doses in by the end of quarter two, which would be the end of June, and that would be sufficient to have every Canadian in the country vaccinated with at least one dose prior to the end of June," she said.

Hajdu added Canada was to procure six million doses by the end of the first quarter and that number reached 9.5 million doses.

"Pfizer has been a tremendously stable partner and we have delivery schedules right up to the end of May that are very solid," she said. "We have other manufacturers who have schedules as well so we anticipate we will be able to meet those targets."

And while that will bring Canada to the beginning of summer, the federal government is also looking far ahead into the future. Prime Minister Justin Trudeau announced on Friday that the federal government has reached a deal with Pfizer to secure 35 million booster shots for next year and 30 million doses the year after.

# BLM organizer happy with Chauvin verdict

**P**itia Modi says he was confident a jury would return a guilty verdict for Derek Chauvin, the former Minneapolis police officer accused of killing Black man George Floyd nearly a year ago.

But the Thunder Bay student was also prepared to hear a not guilty verdict read.

Modi, who helped organize last June's Black Lives Matter rally at Waverly Park, on Wednesday said he watched the Chauvin trial with mixed emotions.

"After the verdict there was definitely a little sense of relief that we saw a police officer held with some accountability. It just shows that we're going in the right direction forward. But there's definitely still a long way to go," said Modi, a St. Ignatius High School graduate who just finished his third year at the University of Windsor.

Chauvin, 45, on Tuesday was found guilty of three counts of murder and manslaughter, having been accused of kneeling on Floyd's neck for nine minutes after a traffic stop, despite the victim uttering his infamous last words, "I can't breathe."

Floyd's May 25, 2020 death led to worldwide protests, that included the burning of a Minneapolis police precinct and forced a nation to take a long hard look at its policing and the racism within.

Modi is hopeful the verdict is a turning point, one that shows police and other law enforcement they will be held to account.

But by no means does he think it solves the problem.

In recent years, a number of high profile killings of Black people, many involving police, have hit the headlines.

In most cases, the accused was found not guilty – or not even charged.

In 2014, New York Police officer Daniel Pantaleo used

a choke-hold on Black man Eric Garner, who later died in hospital. The officer was not charged.

Later that year, Michael Brown was gunned down by Ferguson, Mo. police officer Darren Wilson, who also did not face charges.

In March 2020, Daniel Prude died of asphyxiation while under restraint at the hands of Rochester, N.Y. police and a grand jury decided not to file charges. And then there's the case of Breonna Taylor, a 26-year-old Black woman who was shot to death during a narcotics raid by Louisville, Ky. police, who fired into Taylor's home while executing a no-knock warrant. One officer, Brett Hankison, was indicted on wanton endangerment charges for his alleged actions.

Modi said there's still a lot of work to be done.

"There are a lot of voices, a lot of talking, a lot of push and a lot of change for those false narratives that have been in place for generations. I think if we just keep pushing that forward and we just keep trying to do better. I think we'll get better."

In recent weeks there have been another pair of high-profile police killings in the United States. Chicago Police shot Latino teen Adam Toledo, who was accused of holding a gun when he was killed. A week ago, during the Chauvin trial, a 20-year-old Black motorist, Daunte Wright, was shot and killed by a Brooklyn Centre, Minn. Police officer, who claimed she thought she was firing a Taser.

Kim Potter, who resigned and is out on \$100,000 bail, faces manslaughter charges.

Modi said he remains realistic about the situation facing minorities when dealing with police on both sides of the border, despite Chauvin's conviction.

"It's very sad to see because at the end of the day, just because (Chauvin) was held accountable for his actions, it's still the same system that was operating before, that was built not to serve the Black community. There's something that needs to be done with that system."

# TBaytel dividends add up to \$21.1M

**A** year of COVID-19 had no impact on the annual dividend Tbaytel is providing to the City of Thunder Bay in 2021.

In fact, things went well enough the municipally owned utility will be able to give a special \$2.6-million dividend cheque, over and above the \$18.5 million regular dividend.

President and CEO Dan Topatigh on Tuesday said while the company saw a drop in travel-related data packages, due to travel restrictions in place, they also saw at-home users spend more. People spent more time at home and the demand for higher-quality Internet service grew.

"Every product line was up, but most prevalent was the need for more broadband speed, which was certainly heightened. Our employees were there to respond in a safe and responsible manner," Topatigh said during a Zoom news conference.

He added the company also had to include some strong cost oversights during the first year of the pandemic, without jeopardizing capital spending plans.

"We managed to navigate through the pandemic very well and the end result of that was that our net income ended up at \$20 million and that helped to translate into a performance dividend for the City of Thunder Bay of an additional \$2.6 million, which we're very proud to have achieved."

In addition to the dividends, the company also gave out \$458,179 to 95 organizations in 11 communities through its Tbaytel For Good program, including the Special Olympics Canada Winter Games.

Topatigh said Tbaytel was not unlike most businesses, having to reinvent best practices and standard operating procedures in order to fight through the pandemic, which did take away from the company's bottom line.

"We transitioned a large part of our workforce to work-from-home, and that certainly was a change that we needed to accommodate in short order," Topatigh said.

"We had the typical types of expenses

that related to insuring that our employee base could do their jobs safely and I think that was typical of most organizations that found themselves needing to respond. But I think the thing that we're most proud of is the response to the community needs."

Topatigh said whether that was supporting customers who needed more flexible payment arrangements or other unique supports given to front line workers and school boards and other agencies to help them solve the challenges the pandemic brought, it felt good to be able to help solve the communications portion of the problem.

"It felt quite good that we managed to respond to the community."

The city last year asked Tbaytel to increase its dividend between 2020 and 2023 from \$17.5 million to \$18 million, with any amount above \$17.75 million put in the general capital reserve fund to help cover costs of replacing or repairing municipal infrastructure. Tbaytel gave the city \$18 million a year ago, reducing the property tax levy by 9.3 per cent. This year it's estimated to be equal to a nine per cent reduction to local taxpayers.

# Vaccinations continue to grow

**T**he Thunder Bay District Health Unit has now vaccinated more than 40 per cent of those eligible to get a COVID-19 vaccine.

The health unit says 56,238 people have received one dose of the vaccine, 41 per cent of the 137,728 people currently 60 and older in the district. Of the entire population of the District of Thunder Bay, 34.6 per cent have

received at least one shot.

Across Ontario, as of Monday night the number is 29.4 per cent, according to the COVID-19 Tracker.

A total of 7,879 people in Thunder Bay District received their first dose in the week that ended this past Saturday, 18 more than the week prior.

However, the region's overall weekly dose total was down 621, with 639 fewer people getting a second shot this past week.

# Get smart with doses

Last week, Premier Doug Ford tearfully apologized for his government's handling of recent restrictions put in place to attempt to squash the rapid spread of COVID-19 and its deadly variants of concern.

It takes guts for the leader of a province the size of Ontario to stand up and admit he was wrong.

## City salaries too high

To the editor:

Three-hundred-and-six non-union managerial employees will see their salary rise by approximately \$1573 dollars as council passed an increase of 1.5 percent effective Jan. 1, 2021, and another increase of 1.0 percent effective July 1, 2021 for all non union managerial employees.

I have a few questions for City Manager Norm Gale.

● 1. Why do you think this increase was necessary which will cost taxpayers about \$481,338.

● 2. Why does the city have 306 managers? Thunder Bay's population is just 109,000.

● 3. Why does the city have 559 employees on the sunshine list making an average of \$127,000?.

● 4. Why is the city spending \$71 million to fund these salaries?.

● 5. Other cities in Ontario with a population over 100,000 and less than 150,000 are averaging \$44 million less to fund their sunshine list and have an average of 342 fewer city employees on their sunshine list. Why can't Thunder Bay control it's salaries and staffing levels?

The city of Thunder Bay could save over \$1 billion over the next 25 years if their Sunshine list was in line with other Ontario cities, with a population over 100,000 and under 150,000.

Cities used in the survey were St. Catharines, Milton, Cambridge, Guelph, Kingston, Ajax, Waterloo, Whitby, Chatham-Kent and Thunder Bay.

# Genocide tackled in a multitude of works

The genocide wrought on the Indigenous Peoples of North and South America is explored in *American Holocaust* by David Stannard.

In this work of impassioned scholarship he describes in horrific detail the mass destruction of entire New World societies that followed in the wake of European contact with the Western Hemisphere – destruction that lasted for more than four centuries, and that continues in many places even today. In a sweeping introductory overview of the native cultures of the Americas as they existed prior to 1492, Stannard provides a vibrant context for understanding the human dimension of what was lost in that tragic firestorm of

violence and introduced disease.

He concludes with a searching examination of the religious and cultural roots of Euro-American racism and genocidal behaviour.

In *Native America and the Question of Genocide*, Alex Alvarez considers the destructive beliefs of the European settlers and examines various aspects of genocide through examples such as the Sand Creek Massacre and the Long Walk of the Navajo.

*Accounting for Genocide: Canada's Bureaucratic Assault on Aboriginal People* by Dean Neu & Richard Therrien is an original and controversial book that retells the history of the subjugation and ongoing economic marginalization of Canada's Indigenous Peoples.

Its authors demonstrate the ways in which successive Canadian governments have combined accounting techniques and economic rationalizations with bureaucratic mechanisms –

soft technologies – to deprive Indigenous Peoples of their land and natural resources and to control the detail of their daily economic and social lives.

Particularly shocking is the evidence that federal and provincial governments are today still prepared to use legislative and fiscal devices in order to facilitate the continuing exploitation and damage of Indigenous Peoples lands.

Davis, R & Zannis, M pursue a similar theme in *The Genocide Machine in Canada: the pacification of the North*.

The authors frame genocide as a 'machine' suggesting that it is systematic and driven as much by policies as people. It is a machine that continues to operate regardless who is operating it.

The UN Genocide Convention emerged out of the horrors of the Second World War and focused on the physical destruction of people such as the Jews in the Holocaust.

As such it was difficult to apply this definition – and prove intention and motive – in less obvious cases of ongoing genocide such as that in Canada. Also the UN Convention left the judgement of genocide up to the very governments who were committing it.

When the Convention was discussed in the Canadian parliament the prevailing view was that 'the possibility of the crime of genocide being committed in Canada seems extremely remote'.

And yet genocide had been happening in Canada since first contact with white settlers and had got worse, although more subtle, over time. It is particularly interesting to note that Canada 'helped to sabotage the inclusion of most of the important "cultural genocide" clauses proposed in the draft convention'. It is no accident that cultural genocide has become the predominant form of genocide in Canada.

# Vaccination time

## Mixed bag of emotions arose ahead of appointment

When I looked out my window last Sunday evening the last thing I wanted to see was the freezing rain and snow piling up outside.

Normally I don't worry about April snowstorms but I had an important appointment early Monday morning and I didn't want to be late.

I was pre-booked, pre-screened and prepared to receive my COVID 19 vaccination – I wouldn't let a few inches of ice and snow keep me from my appointed jab.

I went to sleep that night with mixed emotions - anxious to get my shot, cautiously optimistic, relieved that it was finally my turn and nervous for those who still had to wait.

I was experiencing the same vaccine anxiety encountered by millions of Canadians, a mixed bag of emotions that often brings a tear to the eye.

### Emotional

It is hard to tell whether they are tears of sorrow or tears of joy but when some Canadians finally get their COVID vaccination they can't keep from crying.

It is not unusual to get a little choked up or shed a few tears before, during and after the vaccination whenever you reflect on the traumatic events of the past year.

After enduring the life-altering effects of the pandemic the prospect

of receiving my first shot left me with the mixed feelings of relief and disbelief.

Before I left for the clinic in the morning I switched to four-wheel drive – I wasn't taking any chances.

I was wearing a short-sleeved shirt for the occasion and had firmly decided to take the jab in my left arm.

Vaccinations safeguard the safety and good health of local, national and global communities - a pandemic-weary public is breathing a collective sigh of relief.

Actually receiving the vaccination is easy, routine and trouble-free.

Getting a jab in the deltoid muscle of your upper arm is a quick, simple and painless procedure that offers protection from disease and peace of mind during the pandemic.

But apart from some minor physical discomfort from the shot there can be strong emotional side effects that catch people by surprise.

After facing fear and uncertainty for over a year, after the isolation and loneliness, after social distancing and other restrictions, a jab in the arm can open the floodgates.

Sometimes we are overwhelmed by joy and sorrow at the same time which produces a hybrid mix of strong, personal emotions and memories.

A quick jab in the arm is all it takes. I saw a picture of Minister of Health, Patty Hajdu receiving the AstraZeneca vaccine at a local clinic - she continues to lead by example with a calm, reassuring voice.

Canadians have been anxiously and patiently waiting for the vaccine and the protection it provides - Minister Hajdu shared some encouraging news.

### Coming soon

New modelling suggests that if 75 per cent of Canadians get their first dose of COVID 19 vaccine by the end of June, public health restrictions could be relaxed this summer.

She also noted that Canada's vaccine supply is adequate to meet that hopeful target and looking forward, to get our country fully vaccinated.

It is being accomplished steadily and methodically, one arm at a time.

I got to the CLE clinic on time and got my jab – it was a smooth, efficient and hassle-free procedure, almost anti-climactic.

Because even though I received my first dose, not much has changed – I still keep my distance, I still avoid crowds and I still wear a mask.

The only difference is, behind that mask I am wearing a smile – I am smiling with relief, satisfaction and renewed hope.

And right now, that's a fine mix of emotions.

# Eating disorders and body shaming

Expectations unrealistic for most people

As human-beings, we are naturally hyper-critical of ourselves. We compare ourselves to ideals that often don't exist and we measure our self-worth based on validation from those around us.

One of the areas that we are most often sensitive about is our body; we are bombarded, on a daily basis, by images and messages aimed at portraying the 'ideal' body that are often damaging, unrealistic and shame-based. The anxiety and pressure associated with body idealism can often lead to a much greater mental health concern: that is, the development of an eating disorder.

What is an eating disorder exactly? The discussion surrounding body image is often so varied and skewed that the brass tacks of such a diagnosis is commonly missed.

The American Psychiatric Association defines an eating disorder as "behavioral conditions characterized by severe and persistent disturbance in eating behaviors and associated distressing thoughts and emotions".

different. Individuals who are living with Bulimia may secretly binge-eat, commonly associated with a loss of control over the eating, and then try to get rid of the calories in an unhealthy way, typically through vomiting or the misuse of laxatives and weight-loss supplements.

Although different in their presentation, the common thread amongst eating disorders is a

strong sense of discontentment with one's body weight and image. At any given time, eating disorders affect several million people; although anyone can be affected, these individuals are most often women between the ages of

12 and 35. It is also important to recognize that eating disorders often co-occur with other mental health struggles, most typically anxiety, obsessive compulsive disorders and alcohol and drug misuse.

**Must become less awkward**

Similar to many areas of discussion regarding mental health, eating disorders are not often a comfortable discussion for most people to engage in; which is exactly why it needs to be talked about.

The prevalence of these struggles is only increasing as our focus on comparing ourselves to others through areas such as social media continues to grow. Individuals are being bombarded by body image pressure younger and younger; the need to create safe spaces for these discussions more important than ever. Research demonstrates that the most effective treatment for eating disorders is therapy. Additionally, nutrition therapy and medications are sometimes beneficial.

The conversation is not comfortable and we know that.

If you or someone you know needs help, we are here to listen.

**Common disorders**

Although there are a number of different disorders which fall under this category, the most common are Anorexia Nervosa and Bulimia Nervosa. Anorexia is typically characterized by an abnormally low body weight due to an intense fear of gaining weight.

As with most eating disorders, those who suffer from Anorexia have a distorted perception of body image. These individuals also place a high value on controlling their weight and shape typically by severely restricting the amount of food they eat. Individuals who struggle with Bulimia also struggle with a distorted perception of body image, however the presentation of the disorder is slightly



## Brook trout still thriving, surviving

In 1915, the world record brook trout was caught by Dr. Cook of Port Arthur, at Rabbit Rapids on the Nipigon River.

Unfortunately, the damming of the Nipigon River caused water levels to rise more than a hundred feet, wiping out many of the white water sections like Rabbit Rapids.

Yet, more than a century later, the majestic wild brook trout continues to survive, and even thrive, on the Nipigon as well as many other Lake Superior tributaries.

This gorgeous fish also continues to fascinate and inspire many anglers in Northwestern Ontario.

While brook trout belong to the Salmonidae family like rainbows and brown trout, they are actually char.

The main difference is that char are only found in the high (colder) latitudes.

Appearance-wise, trout have light bodies with dark spots while char have dark bodies with light spots. Their scientific name is *Salvelinus fontinalis* but most people in these parts call them speckled trout, specks or brookies.

In the spring, brookies will often enter tributaries of Lake Superior and then return again to these rivers to spawn in the fall. Brook trout prefer very cool water temperatures and they will retreat to Superior or migrate to sections of a river with cold springs during the warmer months of summer.

In lakes, brook trout will also seek out cold upwellings or go deep to find cooler water in the summer.

Brook trout feed heavily on insects, both aquatic and terrestrial, when they are small. As they grow to trophy size, their preferences change to larger fare like minnows, leeches and even amphibians and mice. These interesting menu items, along with their photogenic qualities, make the brook trout a favourite for fly fishermen and women.

A huge boil at the surface as a big brookie sucks in a mouse imitation is a thrill that is hard to match in the world of flyfishing.

In Fisheries Management Zone 6 (Thunder Bay region), brook trout season opened last weekend, as it does each year on the fourth Saturday in April. It will remain open until Labour Day in September.

For all rivers and creeks flowing into Lake Superior, there is a very conservative limit of just one fish that must be over 22 inches to keep.

This regulation, in effect from the first barrier (either a dam or major waterfall) to the lake, essentially makes angling for wild brook trout a catch-and-release fishery.

As a result of this conservative limit and Northwestern Ontario anglers' adoption of effective catch-and-release practices, the chances of catching one of these majestic trout is highly probable for anyone fishing the tributaries of Lake Superior.

For those who enjoy a meal of fresh fish, there are literally dozens and dozens of stocked lakes where no known reproduction occurs and anglers can keep up to five stocked trout, of any size, any time of year.

It is important to understand that the OMNRF is not stocking these trout on top of existing populations of wild fish but rather placing them in lakes where no natural populations exist.

This stocking practice serves to provide recreational angling opportunities while simultaneously alleviating fishing pressure from waters holding precious wild populations of trout.

With more than two pages full of stocked lake opportunities and many exceptions to the brook trout regulations in our region, anglers should always check the most recent fishing regulations summary online and know the specifics for any body of water they intend to fish.

## Oscars were different in 2021

The 93rd Academy Awards is now history. Typical of any awards show there were high and not so high points, but of course this one was different thanks to the pandemic. Audiences were curious to see what approach producer Steven Soderberg and company were going to take.

They tried for something different thematically but they missed out on the entertainment factor. After an impressive walk-in entrance by Regina King, the engaging vigor dissipated, partly due to multiple locations being employed.

Though familiar and formulaic, a witty host might've helped to center and invigorate the proceedings.

### Missed opportunity

Notwithstanding the excellent performances by Hopkins and *Nomadland*'s best actress winner Frances McDormand, the best actor and actress awards remained out of reach for Mr. Boseman and Viola Davis, performers of colour.

There were some humorous human moments and milestones.

*Nomadland*'s Chloe Zhao won for best director, becoming the first woman of Asian descent to win, and only the second woman to win in that category.

Yuh-jung Youn, who won best supporting actress for *Minari*, endearingly noted that she just happened to be "a bit luckier" than her fellow nominees and forgave mispronunciations of her name.

She became the first Korean actor to win an Oscar.

*Judas and the Black Messiah*'s Daniel Kaluuya who won for Best

Frances McDormand gave an odd brief speech, let out a wolf howl and urged audiences, once the pandemic passes, to go 'shoulder to shoulder' in

movie theatres to see all the nominated films

Some new wrinkles weren't so successful. Highlighting the nominees' personal back stories to underline the "stories matter" theme proved awkward and slowed the proceedings.

Where was the usual orchestra walk-off to govern the over-extended acceptance speeches?

A weird little musical quiz was redeemed thanks only to Glenn Close lively jiving to *Da Butt*.

The show's producers were so convinced that Mr. Boseman was

going to win best actor, they pushed that category to the end, a spot traditionally reserved for best picture. But surprise winner Hopkins was a no-show, so the big emotional climax went poof. *Nomadland*'s best picture win was announced third last.

Streaming allowed audiences to access titles that otherwise might not have been available but did premium fees negate that advantage?

Some industry forecasters predict hearty movie-goer turnouts once COVID's done. We can only hope they're right.

There will be another option, however.

"Folklore, had it been able to run, would have taken place on the May 1-2 Weekend and that is when our VIRTUAL Folklore Festival 2021 will run on our website [www.folklorefestival.ca](http://www.folklorefestival.ca) with a shorter version on Facebook, and we will continue to run it for several months for your enjoyment," said Jeanetty Jumah, in an email release.

"We can all come together virtually and celebrate the rich diversity of Canada and take visitors on a trip around the world to experience the magnificent sights, sounds and flavours woven into the fabric of our country by our various ethno-cultural and Aboriginal communities."

Jumah said she's hopeful the traditional Folklore Festival, which is run by the Thunder Bay Multicultural Association and the Folklore Festival Organizing Committee, can return to Fort William Gardens in 2022.

## Sioux Lookout to rejoin SIJHL fold

**M**ake no mistake about it, the Sioux Lookout Bombers are being built to win, and win fast.

But between now and when the puck drops in September 2022, the Superior International Junior Hockey League's record eight franchise has plenty of growing – and fundraising to do.

Matt Cairns, one of four co-owners of the team, said the team was born of a desire to bring high-calibre hockey to the Northern Ontario community.

But it's more than that, he said. "We're all from the north here. We all love hockey. We were all sad to see the Flyers leave," Cairns said, referencing the SIJHL's former Sioux Lookout franchise, which spent four seasons in the league, dropping out three games into the 2012-13 campaign.

"It left kind of a void in the community. I've wanted to see junior A hockey come back for several years. It just kind of presented itself now."

He's confident it's the right time for the ownership team, which includes Joe Cassidy, Austen Hoey and Christine Hoey, a fresh group with fresh ideas, in a league that itself has evolved into something much different than it was nine years ago when the largely unsuccessful-on-the-ice Flyers folded.

### Everyone agreed

"We got unanimous support by the board of governors of the SIJHL, which speaks volumes, I think, about the level of confidence they have in our ability to put a program together that will be successful long-term," said Cairns who has also been working closely with the Kam River Fighting Walleye ownership group, a first-year success story from the abbreviated 2021-22 SIJHL season, to overcome any expansion pitfalls that might fall their way.

Austen Hoey, the Bombers director of hockey operations, said the team will also be an inspiration to developing hockey players in the region.

While they won't focus solely on Sioux Lookout and area players, the team will provide another route for the better players in the region to continue on in the game.

"I believe that, especially in a community like ours, where right now the highest level of hockey for players to aspire to is the high school hockey team," Hoey said.

"Not that there's anything wrong with that, but when there is a junior team here, it does ask those minor hockey league players to kind of push themselves a little bit harder, because now they know the bar they are looking to get to is that much higher. I think it kind of creates a culture."

For now, finding those players is low on the priority list, with 17 months to go before the puck drops.

Cairns said the team, named after the water bombers that protect Ontario's northwest from the threat of forest

fires each year and patterned after the former Queen Elizabeth High School team's green and gold colour scheme, has already begun building relationships in the Sioux Lookout area, including nearby First Nations.


The team is looking to raise about \$150,000 to cover start-up costs, league dues and expansion fees, through partnerships with the local business community, planned raffles and a charity golf tournament.

League commissioner Darrin Nicholas said the league is looking to grow to 10 teams and Sioux Lookout was always high on their list, a natural rival with teams in Dryden and Fort Frances, and one whose potential fan base in the past showed a willingness to support SIJHL hockey.

"Certainly there's no secret that high on our priority list was getting more teams involved and more communities involved in the league. I think I said very early in my tenure that our goal was to work toward 10. We can't get to 10 before we get to eight," Nicholas said.

"As we looked around, kind of at the landscape, at the places we thought it made sense for the league to participate in, clearly Sioux Lookout was the leading candidate, with a facility that's already housed a team in our league, that's still capable of housing a team in our league."

# Former Cat Vosler makes MLB debut

Until Saturday night, only seven former Thunder Bay Border Cats had made the major leagues.

Jason Vosler made it eight.

The infielder, who hit .304 in spring training, was recalled by the San Francisco Giants from their alternate training site and made his debut against the Miami Marlins, pinch-hitting for pitcher Kevin Gausman.

On Sunday, the 27-year-old came off the bench again, taking over at third for Wilmer Vores. In his second at bat of the afternoon, Vosler lifted a soft fly ball to right that fell in front of Marlins outfielder Garrett Cooper.

He then stole second, adding another first to his MLB scrapbook.

"That's a moment you dream about since you were a kid," Vosler told MLB.com. "When I got to first base, Antwan [Richardson] was like, 'Take it in, look around. This is a special moment.' I'm happy he said that because when he did say that, I kind of focused up and really appreciated the moment and appreciated where I was."

It's a long way from Thunder Bay, where Vosler spent the 2013 Northwoods League season, hitting .275 with seven home runs and 47 RBI, to the shores of McCovey Cove.

The West Nyack, N.Y. native spent six seasons in the minors, including four in the Chicago Cubs system and the past two with the San Diego Padres.

"He was a really good kid," reminisced Cats vice-president Bryan Graham on Sunday.

"It's another impressive story of perseverance. He's been knocking on the door the past few years at AAA, so it's great to see him finally make it to the big leagues."

So, who are the other seven former Cats to reach the majors?

Here's a rundown:

**Matt Mangini:** The first to make the jump, Mangini played 11 games for Seattle in 2010, hitting .211 with one RBI.

**Jonathan Diaz:** Defensive whiz spent 12 seasons in the minors and parts of three in the big leagues with Boston and Toronto, hitting .145 with six RBI. He won a World Series ring with Boston in 2013.

**Blaine Hardy:** The lefty only pitched one game for Thunder Bay, but went on to pitch six seasons with the Detroit Tigers, compiling a 14-10 record with a 3.73 ERA and a 1.32 WHIP in 233 appearances, the most by any former Border Cats player. He signed a minor-league deal with Milwaukee this year.

**Seth Frankhoff:** Went 3-1 for the Border Cats in 2008 and debuted with the Chicago Cubs in 2017, making one two-inning appearance before heading

overseas to play in Korea. The righty tossed 2.2 innings for Seattle last season and is with the Arizona Diamondbacks organization in 2021.

**A.J. Schugel:** An infielder who occasionally pitched for the Cats in 2009 and 2010, Schugel was drafted as a pitcher by the Los Angeles Angels, who in 2013 dealt him to Arizona in a three-way trade that included Mark Trumbo, Adam Eaton and the late Tyler Skaggs. Schugel spent three seasons in the big leagues, going 6-2 with a 3.19 nine ERA as a reliever for Arizona and Pittsburgh.

**Wes Parsons:** An all-star starter for the Cats in 2012, Parsons pitched parts of two seasons with Atlanta and Colorado in 2018 and 2019, going 1-3 with a 5.67 ERA. He signed with the KBO's NC Dinos this past offseason.

**Ryan Court:** Perhaps the Cinderella story of 2019, Court languished for nine seasons in the minors with Arizona, Boston and the Chicago Cubs before finally getting a taste of the big leagues with the Seattle Mariners. Court was 5-for-24 with a home run and five RBI.
